Mayra shared that the Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade recently had a University of Miami, MD/MPH Candidate (Class of 2023), Douglas Sirutis, who completed an internship at the Office of Community Health & Planning. The intern completed an assignment to identify Miami-Dade County zip codes with a combination of the highest percentages of underserved, elderly individuals ages 65 years or older, who are not physically active. During today's meeting, the indicators looked at to help identify the zip codes of interest, such as, physically inactive, obese, living less than a 10-minute walk from a park, and living under the poverty level, 	Action Item(s): • Continue discussion and planning for these activities at future EIC meetings

were shared on-screen. The data compiled in an Excel document, a map created of the 16 zip codes with most identified need, and a summary document completed by the intern were also shared on-screen during the meeting, and emailed to all members after the meeting on 3/29/23. It was explained that all the indicators are in terms of percent of population falling under or exhibiting the indicator within each respective zip code: age 65 and older (2020 US Census), obesity and physical inactivity (CDC Places using BRFSS 2020 or 2019, Census 2010, and American Community Survey (ACS) 2015-2019), living within a 10 minute walk from a park (Florida Tracking using data from CDC Places), percentage of people age 65 and over living below the federal poverty level, as well as percentage of people living below the poverty level by race for the following races: Black or African American, Hispanic or Latino, American Indian or Alaska Native, Asian, two or more races, White, and White alone, not Hispanic or Latino. (2020 US Census using ACS 2015-2019). Excel was used to categorize all indicator percentages into quartiles for each zip code. Afterwards, 16 zip codes best representing a combination of the highest percentages of underserved, of elderly individuals, and of those who are not physically active were identified. The associated data of the 16 zip codes and a file with Miami-Dade County zip code geographic information were then uploaded to an online interface, Datawrapper, to create the map. This map and the 16 zip codes can be used to guide the planning of further work plan activities related to planning a walk to encourage physical activity, and create a campaign to raise awareness of the importance of physical activity.

Open Spaces with the assistance of EIC member, Allan Tavss, Active Older Adults Program Coordinator, Miami-Dade County Parks. The goal would be to promote park locations and programs in general, as well as identify parks and programming that correspond to the 16 underserved zip codes identified through the data analyzed for older adults.
